# Annual Education Results Report 2017/18

**<u>Vision</u>** Each child achieving academic, personal and musical excellence.

## We Achieve

- Suzuki Charter School students demonstrated outstanding achievement on the June 2018 Provincial Achievement Tests in the areas of Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, and Science.
- Suzuki students attained a very high rate of EXCELLENCE (attainment of a grade of at least 80%) that is significantly higher than their provincial counterparts. The percentage of Suzuki students attaining the excellence rating ranged between 25% and 60.4% compared to provincial averages between 14% and 30.5%.
- Students are to be congratulated for their focus on learning as demonstrated by these outstanding scores. Parents and teachers are also to be congratulated for their role in supporting students to be well prepared to meet high expectations for success as demonstrated in their achievement results.

- Participated in active citizenship projects including: Terry Fox Run, Family Dance donations to the ESO YONA-Sistema, Food Bank donations, "Tidings of Comfort and Joy" care packages for the Mustard Seed, and sharing the gift of music within the community.


## <u>Accomplishments</u>

#### Notable accomplishments in the year 2017/18 include:

Instruction:

- Excellent Overall rating on Accountability Pillar Results.
- Scheduled purposeful, collaborative planning time to focus on curriculum portfolio initiatives, mentorship, cross grade groupings for cohesive and aligned program planning in literacy and numeracy, and music and academic integration and project planning.
- Initiated lead teacher to increase consultation and coordination of PD and resource/activity development to support improved understanding of indigenous perspectives and implications for teaching and learning within the new TQS.
- Supported collaborative PD sessions with academic and music teachers including staff sharing curriculum portfolio initiatives focused on literacy and numeracy.
- Initiated consultants to support inclusive education early identification and intervention including Kinder screening, speech and language practitioner and mental health support.
- Reviewed technology standards and evergreen program.
- Provided opportunities for PD in the areas of literacy and numeracy including application of assessment tools including EPSB MIPI tool, and Renaissance STAR 360 Early Literacy and Reading assessments, SLA, and K-2 literacy program alignment. Music:
- Celebrated our 23rd Anniversary by performing choral and instrumental music at the Winspear Centre including improved concert logistics and an internal conductor.
- Purchased three new upright pianos, benches, xylophones, and metallophones.
- Implemented capping music group class numbers to ensure a balanced music program.
- Reviewed/implemented rehearsal and concert improvements.
- Increased performance/planned fine arts integration activities including music and academic integration activities, musical theatre performances, shared performance i.e. sign language, refined repertoire selection, hip-hop dance workshop, and facilitated grade 6 student composition for Winspear concert.
- Revised/aligned music standards for instrument group classes.
- Scheduled opportunities for music and academic teachers to participate in classroom observations and cross-curricular planning.
- Initiated inspiring musicians project.
- Developed music team leadership through coaching, PD, and shared opportunities to share knowledge with stakeholders i.e. SAA conference in Minneapolis, and Suzuki teacher training in Dalcroze and Suzuki approach in Edmonton and Calgary. Leadership and Management:

Funding for the 2017-2018 year was increased due to the identification of ECS students who fall within the mild/moderate category and students in grades one to six under special needs funding. With this increase in funding expenditures increased to meet the needs of the identified students. School Administration developed a two phase plan to expend the additional funding which was approved by the Board.

#### School Generated Funds

Fundraising activities are determined by the School Principal in consultation with School Council and staff. Ten percent of all fundraising dollars are allocated to a bursary to help offset the cost of Suzuki private music lessons for families who may require financial assistance to pay the cost of private music lessons.
